In Preparation:

Islands of Memory: Postcolonialism, the Holocaust, and Literary Politics. This book examines the construction of post-catastrophe cultural memory in Hebrew and Caribbean literatures. I discuss Caribbean-born authors Jamaica Kincaid, Wilson Harris, and Édouard Glissant, and Israeli writers Aharon Appelfeld and Orly Castel-Bloom in terms of their shared aesthetic and political concerns in the aftermath of colonialism, slavery, and the Shoah. I argue that the use of repetition as a thematic and formal device in their works reveals comparable historical philosophies in which each author negates teleologies of the present and imagines or reclaims critical marginal formations of a disjunctive past.

“Resituations: Repetition, Nationalism, and the Traumas of Modernity in the Writing of Aharon Appelfeld and Édouard Glissant,” 398 pp, University of California, Berkeley, December 2003.

Thesis: The works of Aharon Appelfeld and Édouard Glissant present a challenge to collective representational codes that achieved dominance prior to the Second World War within their respective societies, Israel and Martinique. Responding to the Modernist emphasis on ‘return’ that is evident in both the Césairean theme of *retour* and in neo-Romantic Hebrew literature’s nostalgia for origins, Glissant and Appelfeld formulated distinctive literary idioms that are unexpectedly comparable in their use of the figure of repetition. The dislocating but potentially transformative figure of repetition signals, in their writings, history’s haunting force in the postcolonial and post-*Shoah* conditions.
